





- 29 also received financial assistance




OPERATING EXPENSES \$15,048,000

6% Fundraising




OPERATING REVENUE

FOSTER CARE & ADOPTION

Children who've been removed from home need compassion and special care. We served 236 children and teens, with the goal of helping them transition safely into permanent homes.

Foster Care and Therapeutic Foster Care

- 175 served
 - 13 adopted
 - 23 on adoption track

Juvenile Justice Foster Care

- 15 served, outcomes below

Rapid Response Crisis Stabilization

Emergency placements to stabilize families, prevent abuse and neglect, provide short-term treatment.

- 46 served
 - 28 returned home
 - 13 discharged to group home or inpatient facility



JUVENILE JUSTICE

We help repeat juvenile offenders to imagine and achieve a better life. We teach them to respect authority and rules, manage their impulses, and set goals. We help them catch up in school and plan their careers.

Outcomes at Discharge:

Multipurpose, Transitional Living, Foster Homes

- 85% performed at grade level up from 45% at admission
- 80% accepted authority up from 45% at admission
- 85% demonstrated age-appropriate social behavior up from 67% at admission
- 89% showed substance-free behavior up from 47% at admission
- 68% demonstrated honesty behavior up from 34% at admission

Outcomes at Case Closure:

In-Home Services

Transition / Re-Entry and Family Preservation

- 90% showed improved family function

Work4It Vocational Education

- 100% took part in vocational skill building
- 100% avoided reoffending

Crisis and Assessment Centers:

New service: 78 youth were removed from home to stabilize behaviors; they received quick access to crisis intervention, assessment, and service planning.



FAMILY PRESERVATION

Our specialists travel into the community to teach skills that families need to keep children safely in their homes.

Outcomes at Case Closure:

Intensive Family Preservation

- 96% of families stayed together

Outcomes at Case Closure:

Family Reunification

- 67% of families were reunified



EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION

The Jordan Child & Family Enrichment Center is a five-star child care center that serves typically and atypically developing children in inclusive classrooms.

- 49% received financial assistance
- 21% had developmental disabilities
- 76% of rising kindergarteners with disabilities were recommended for a regular classroom with support
- 100% of rising kindergarteners with typical development met or exceeded widely held expectations for school readiness



SPECIALIZED SERVICES

Specialized services, known as FACT, help young people who are dually diagnosed with mental illness / severe emotional disorders and underlying developmental disabilities such as autism or intellectual disabilities. Services include group homes, day treatment, and outpatient.

- 82% of discharged youth returned successfully to home and school communities
